### **COURSE OVERVIEW**

This course aims to familiarize students with basic terms in iconography and the basic principles of iconographic research through the analysis of antique works of art. The aim of the course is to identify and understand the elements of antique iconographic vocabulary. Moreover, this course is designed to familiarize students with selected topics and contents relating to antique art.

The acquisition of basic iconographic concepts and methodological principles, with particular emphasis on antique iconography; the ability to interpret an ancient iconographic work in its historical context; the acquisition of skills that will enable students to identify, analyze and interpret certain monuments and their pictorial elements. The acquisition of knowledge about the sources of iconic iconography and the ability to identify the main themes and motifs related to ancient mythology.

The aim is to familiarize students with the characteristics of different periods in the history of ancient art, and to introduce them to basic historical facts pertaining to these periods.
