I. DETAILED COURSE DESCRIPTION

COURSE OVERVIEW

The course focusses on cross-cultural communication in foreign language acquisition that is on the interaction between speakers of different cultural backgrounds, which becomes increasingly important in times of globalization and fast worldwide communication. In order to provide a better understanding of the connection between the terms culture and communication, we will define and discuss them first. The main part of the course is dedicated to cross-cultural competence as an important precondition for a successful cross-cultural communication. The constituents of this competence will be presented and described with several examples. Both the written and oral communication will be included. The importance of knowing and understanding the differences between cultures in non-verbal interaction will be emphasized. The aim of this course is to highlight the importance of cross-cultural communication in foreign language acquisition and to raise the awareness of cultural differences.

- recognize cross-cultural and interlingual interference, and deal with it;
